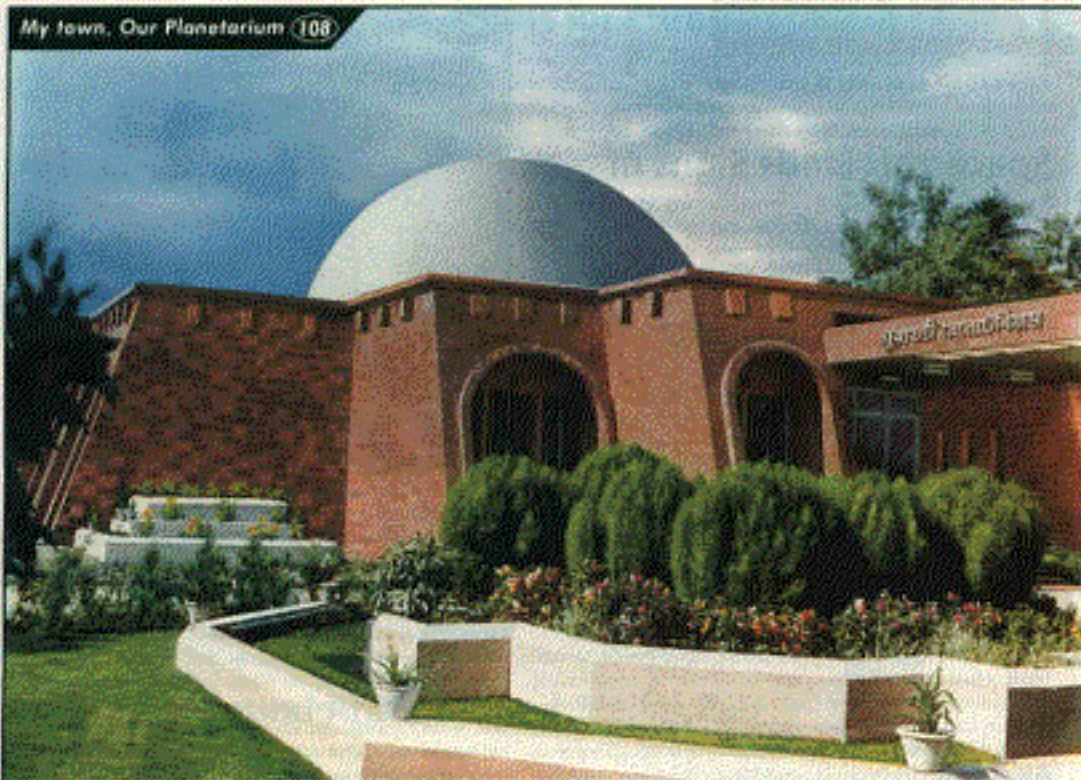

Guwahati Planetarium

Guwahati is situated on the southern bank of the Brahmaputra River. The city has been a crossroads for routes into northeastern India since ancient times. Many kingdoms of the past have had their capitals on this site, which in the epic of India has been referred to as Pragyotishpura (the city of astronomy). Since time immemorial, it has been a great seat of learning. Hsuan Tsang, the great Chinese traveler, visited Pragyotishpura in the 7th century and

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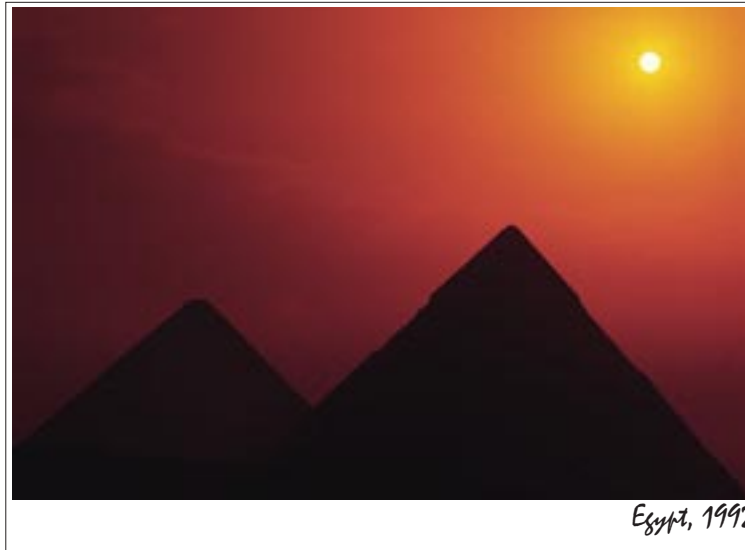

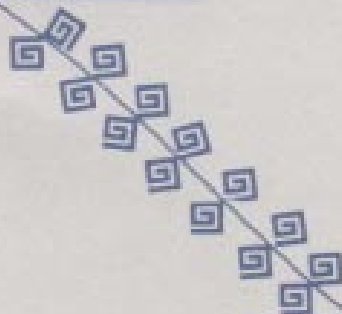
